She created a successful line of beauty care products for Black women and went on to build a thriving enterprise that included a factory, hair salon, mail-order business, and beauty school training over 20,000 sales agents. Later in life, Walker became a philanthropist and activist, helping to organize the NAACP's Silent Protest Parade in New York City in 1917.
