Looking at America Through the Eyes of Its Artists



Early American Art: 17th to early 19th Century

Thurs., Apr. 23 at 6:00pm

Art educator Laura Nicholls explores the origins of American visual art, tracing its earliest roots to Indigenous and Spanish Colonial traditions.

During the Colonial era leading up to the American Revolution, artists often followed European styles, creating portraits and landscapes that reflected wealth, land ownership, and social status. After independence in 1776, art took on a new role in the United States. Artists helped define the identity of a young nation by portraying its early leaders and using visual storytelling to share a collective history and sense of purpose.



A Time of Change and Unity

In the early twentieth century, American artists initially followed European academic traditions, until figures such as Robert Henri shifted focus toward the realities of modern urban life. Facilitated by art educator Laura Nicholls, this exploration highlights how the 1913 Armory Show introduced European Modernism to American audiences, inspiring new approaches that blended abstraction with imagery drawn from cities as well as the rural Midwest and Southwest.



Growth, Change, Nature's Bounty: The Civil War and the Gilded Age

Thurs., Jun. 25 at 6:00pm

The nineteenth century in the United States was a period of rapid growth and transformation. Themes of exploration, nationalism, and the romantic vision of the American West strongly shaped the art of the era. The Hudson River School marked the first distinctly American art movement, capturing the changing landscape during westward expansion. Following the Civil War, a sense of optimism fueled continued growth and new artistic directions.

Hamilton: An American Musical swept the Tonys with 11 awards, bringing to life the rivalry between Alexander Hamilton and Aaron Burr – history's most infamous frenemies. Burr, once a Lieutenant Colonel in the Revolutionary War, scandalized society with an illicit affair, then rose to power as Vice President under Thomas Jefferson. But his legacy was sealed on the dueling grounds of Weehawken, NJ, where he killed Hamilton in cold blood. Though he escaped a murder charge, Burr later faced trial for treason.

Join Rick Feingold as he delves into the lives of the women who shaped Burr's life.



A Conversation with Alexis Coe, Author of You Never Forget Your First: A Biography of George Washington

Three \$2,500.00 scholarships will be awarded, sponsored by Library benefactors Glenn P. and Susan D. Dickes and one anonymous donor.






